	 The article was published in a (double blind) peer-reviewed journal / in an academic journal.
	Answers might also relate to the fact that the author is a lecturer at a highly ranked university, or that the article was published in 2018 so it is up-to-date.
	Examples:
	 I think this article is reliable because it is published in a peer-reviewed journal. In my opinion this article is reliable. It was published in 2018. It was written by a lecturer at the important Southeast University in Bangladesh, and it is published in The Journal of Education and Learning which is peer reviewed. The article by Faieza Chowdhury is reliable because it appears in an academic journal.
3 pts	Answers that conclude the article is reliable but don't give sufficient justification.
	Examples:
	 This article was written in the Journal of Education and Learning so it reliable. (The answer must explain that this is a peer reviewed journal or an academic journal). I think this is a reliable article because it was published in 2018. (This is not enough to determine that the article is reliable). The writer works at a good university so this article is reliable. (Academics also
	publish articles in newspapers, magazines etc. The answer must explain that this article was published in a peer reviewed journal or an academic journal).
0 pts	 Answers that don't state that the article is reliable Answers without any justification Answers that contradict themselves or are inaccurate

Q8	
5 pts	To receive full points, the answer has to state whether the article is reliable or not, and provide relevant justification.
	An answer that claims the article is reliable should relate to the following information:
	 The Washington Post is a leading American newspaper and is mostly credible. The newspaper publishes fact-checked articles. The author is an academic from a pre-eminent university.
	Answers might also relate to the fact that the article was published in 2021 so it is up-to-date.
	An answer that claims the article is unreliable should relate to the following information:
	 The Washington post is not an academic journal / The article was not peer- reviewed.
	An answer that is uncertain about the reliability is also acceptable. It should be logical.
	Examples
	 I don't think this is a reliable article because it was published in a newspaper which is not peer reviewed.
	 I think the article is reliable because the author is credible – Zachary Bleemer is an academic from very important universities.
	• It might be a reliable article because the articles are fact checked, and it is up-to-date. On the other hand, the article was published in a newspaper and not in an academic journal so it's hard to tell.
3 pts	Answers that conclude the article is reliable/unreliable but don't give sufficient justification.
	Examples:
	 I think this is a reliable article because it was written by Zachary Bleemer in 2021. (Doesn't explain why this is a reliable author).
0 pts	Answers that are not logical or are inaccurate.

2 pts	 An answer with any of the following ideas: The effects of grade inflation. Whether higher grades improve or hinder learning.
0 pts	Answers that are not logical or are inaccurate.

3 pts	 An answer with any of the following ideas: Grade inflation may be providing important benefits to many of today's students. Inflating grades might narrow the gender gap in STEM fields. Grade inflation encourages students to persist with their education despite challenges.
